A-list celebrity psychic reveals all

Lo wants to know what she thinks about nearly everything. Hillary Clinton consults with her regularly. She even has an line to the White House.

Not bad for a middle-aged psychic from Queens.

Since Carmen Harra's book, "Everyday Karma" (Ballantine Books; \$22.95) was released last November, it's been a bestseller. She's since appeared on the "Today" show and "Larry King Live." She now gets at least fifty calls a day - more than triple her

Perhaps even more alarming to Lo, Harra says her career will fizzle by 2008.

"She's got too much going on For her she's too trapped. It's all about success," says Harra. "She can either transform spiritually like Madonna or end up like Liz Taylor: eight marriages, alcohol-ism, a tumor." As for Lopez's sis-ter Lynda (who is also sill a cli-ent), she "cries to me," says Harra.

bright pink clothing, jewelry, and make-up. She says she uses a combination of numerology, as trology, and good-old-fashioned intoition when doing readings. When she was five, she nearly drowned, and claims that this near-death experience left her with paranormal powers: she says she hears voices "from the other

her client roster rapidly grew to include Courteney Cox ("I told her to move to L.A. and that she would get a big TV job and marry a younger man"), model Fredericus and der Wast Willers Clinton que van der Waal, Hillary Clinton, and other celebrities whose names she says she cannot reveal. She will say, however, that she foresaw Clinton's Senate win back

in 1997, when she did her first reading for the then-First Lady. "She said, "I don't even want to run," says Harra. She adds that she still talks to the Senator regularly on the phone through an intermediary, and predicts that Hill-

ary will run against another female candidate in the 2008 presidential election.

She also predicts that Hillary will never divorce Bill, and that her daughter, Chelsea, will be married in two years and not to married in two years - and not to Ian Klaus, the Oxford student with whom she's been on a nonstop make-out tour of Europe.
